

Let Us Pray For One Another.

One day at work I happened to meet a lady in the hall who I'd worked with in times past. She has known of my relationship with the Lord and took the opportunity to invite me to participate in a weekly gathering of believers. I'm now pleased to try to make it to the headquarters chapel to share in a short scripture study and a time of prayer with a few other Christians Wednesdays, at 11:30 A.M.

The composition of the group varies with work schedules but all are welcomed to participate - whether they are "regulars" or just the occasional drop-ins.

I'm not sure of the current leader's denominational background (it's not important and, frankly, denominational issues are not the focus) but he's very scripturally literate and that knowledge helps his discussion of any particular scripture being considered for the day.

In this forum it's been my privilege to both request prayers for others and to offer them with the group. The norm is to have members relate current needs they're aware of and then to ask for volunteer individuals to vocalize prayers for each need.

Two recent concerns of mine have been Ernie and Sharon. This couple is not affiliated with Community of Christ but I was asked to check in on Ernie while on a hospital visit with a church friend who knew Ernie. Upon learning who I was, and who I'd been visiting, Ernie welcomed me like an



old friend. I learned that Ernie was facing brain surgery for a cancerous tumor. That was significant enough but I also learned that his wife (Sharon) was dealing with cancer herself. She was actually receiving treatments, but in a different hospital. In such a troubling time, two people who have committed their lives to one another couldn't even be together for mutual support! That first visit was short, but others have followed.

Ernie's since had his surgery. The focus was on extending life, not offering a cure. While the surgery was successful for what it attempted the road to recovery has been rough for both Ernie and Sharon. He remains weak on his left side, his emotional control is affected and he has had other difficulties. He just started radiation treatments today (27 Jan 2016). After Sharon's treatment she'd spent every waking hour with Ernie. But, again, just as he starts this new treatment, Sharon's confined to a different hospital to endure her own.

Today, when I joined with other believers in the HQ chapel, we lifted up the needs of our brother and sister, Ernie and Sharon. We asked wisdom for the family and for the medical community. We asked for God's special care. And we asked for the Spirit to grant them each the peace that passes all understanding. Ernie and Sharon may never cross the door threshold of any of our church buildings but we commit to be with them on the path of the disciple. Let us pray for one another.

In Christ - Victory! May God bless all Peacekeepers.

Sacred space for me is wherever I have spiritual experiences. Most often this has to do with the church in some way, such as places like the Stone Church sanctuary with its inspiring stained glass windows. It might be where a specific event takes place like a youth camp, reunion, or conference. I have also experienced sacred space in nature. Many times it is a view looking into a valley with mountains all around – clouds hugging the peaks. As I come around a bend in a trail and discover a waterfall and creek, I know I am in a sacred space. Often there are animals in the scene such as deer, elk, or turkeys.

While ministering in the Florida and Southeast Mission Centers, I saw gorgeous and dramatic sunsets of all colors. I would come across a nearly hidden wild flow with a hummingbird or a bumblebee giving it its full attention as nature ordained. Created by God, I consider all space sacred.

One fall, medical testing determined I had the beginning stages of prostate cancer. The radiation procedure required several 25 minute sessions for nearly three months. During treatment I had to lie as still as possible.

It was during this time I found myself thinking of people, groups, and concerns for which to pray for God's blessing or guidance. Most often I didn't know how God would bless the people I prayed for, but I knew that a blessing would occur. With ten days left in my treatment, I received an e-mail request for prayers from Derrick, a church brother, who would undergo knee replacement surgery. For the rest of my treatment time, I used the sacred space of the treatment table to focus on my prayers for his surgery and recovery. I prayed not only for Derrick and his family, but also gave thanks for the giftedness of his doctors and all medical personnel caring for him.

I have learned from this experience that wherever I find myself on life's journey, I will encounter the holy – even on a radiation treatment table.
