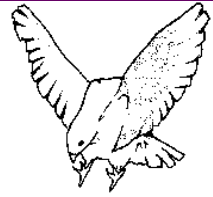

Can you imagine – thinking that family names weren’t good enough to protect your children from a vengeful or jealous God?

My Aunt Enid told me once that when their only daughter, Joy died on their farm in Iowa, a neighbor consoled her with “at least it wasn’t one of the boys.” She was to take comfort in the fact that her husband still had help for the farm chores.

I witness every day the unexpected and surprising things children can come up with. I just don’t feel the same when adults show such a lack of intelligence. 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*The latter splendor of this house shall be greater than the former, says the Lord of hosts; and in this place I will give prosperity, says the Lord of hosts.*  
—Haggai 2: 9 NRSV

The prophet Haggai writes to the Israelites about their disappointment that the new Jerusalem Temple being built is so much smaller with less grandeur than the Temple that had been destroyed. The Israelites are discouraged that they are not experiencing the same level of prosperity as before their Babylonian exile.



Haggai reminds them that despite material hardships, God's Spirit abides with them, and there is nothing to fear.

I relate to the context of Haggai's ministry. Frequently people ask me why congregational life is so different today as compared with years ago. People seem filled with fear about the future.

Congregational leadership says how tired it feels. It seems like the way of "being" church is not working as it used to. People express concern that God has abandoned them.

Like Haggai, I see God's Spirit continuing to abide with us and calling us to respond, without fear, to the needs in the world. Congregations are sent as a faith community into the world to seek God's peace.

How is your congregation serving beyond the walls of your building to proclaim Jesus Christ and promote communities of joy, hope, love and peace?
